About Today's Performers

Pauline Delamotte completed her early flute studies in her native France. After having graduated in 2022 from the Guildhall School of Music and Drama with a Bachelor with Honours, First Class, she is continuing postgraduate studies there on the Orchestral Artistry course, delivered in partnership with the London Symphony Orchestra. She has taken part in various orchestral projects at Guildhall, including playing in the Guildhall Symphony Orchestra, opera productions, Guildhall UBU ensemble and the Firebird suite 1919 playthrough project conducted by Gianandrea Noseda. She has also played in the Orion Orchestra and performs regularly in the Young Musicians Symphony Orchestra (YMSO). Passionate about chamber music, she is part of Trio de Lumière, a 'two flutes and piano' trio, with who she performs across London.
